Love Thy Neighbor

In Mark 12:31, God gave us the second greatest commandment, "... Love your neighbor as yourself..." Yet I do not think God uses the term "neighbor" to refer to people who live right next to us or even in our neighborhood only. To be a neighbor, according to Jesus, means to "come alongside someone".

According to the United Nations refugee agency, during 2010-2020, about ten percent of all refugees who escaped to America landed in California, second only to the state of Texas. Since 2017, more than fifty percent of all refugees are of the Islam faith. That speaks greatly of how God has already brought some unreached people groups to our midst, without us having to apply for travel visas, and without us having to give legitimate reasons to dwell in some countries

For many Chinese Americans, they immigrated to the U.S with their families. With relatives already living here or jobs waiting, many planned for the move, even though that process could sometimes take years to happen. In contrast, a refugee is "someone who has been forced to flee his or her country to another country because of persecution, war or violence." Often there wasn't much time to pack up or say goodbye, depending on the severity of the situation of the hostility. They often had to flee with nothing more than the clothes on their back, leaving behind homes, possessions, jobs and loved ones, not knowing what awaits them in the new place. Escaping to a foreign country where the refugees do not speak a word, or much, of the new language is enough to make them feel helpless and hopeless, disillusioned and disoriented, and can do nothing but wait for others to help them.

This is exactly where we, as Christ believers, could come in. In a recent webinar by OMF, members from churches in Southern California, the San Francisco Bay Area, and Texas shared that they have already been reaching out to the refugee communities—help them to receive benefits, apply for medical assistance, find housing, enrolling their children to schools, helping them to find jobs, helping teens to join short-term camps, having workshops for new immigrants etc. A church in North Dallas invites children of refugees to Kids Club, playing soccer and other sports and games. Even when the church put in some gospel message with the practice sessions, those parents are still willing to send their kids to participate.

The biggest challenge in refugee ministry is, naturally, language. Only a very small percentage of refugees can communicate in English. Most of them have difficulties in functioning in the language. Some are even illiterates. Translators are certainly needed for this ministry. But through prayers and seeking God for His direction, He will provide. In one case, God even provided a missionary who has spent ten years in Afghanistan to work with a particular church. Don't forget that perhaps one of the best communicators is still love.

"How do I get involved in reaching out to the refugees who are mostly Muslims?" Many Chinese churches have long focus mainly on outreach of the Chinese population. They hesitate how to do cross-cultural ministry when they haven't even been that immersed in same-cultural ministry. Our church has been in partnership with an American Afghan church in the Bay area. During last year's Easter, we put together and handed out a gift bag for each family at their Easter Egg Hunt. Then we also went to apartments in an area where many Afghans reside and passed out more gift bags, which also include a Bible each in their native language. During the time we went from floor to floor and room to room, there were Afghan families who politely refused the bag and said they only worship Allah. That's alright, we just do our part and let God do the rest. I even encountered a few Chinese families who were surprised that as fellow Chinese, we were reaching out to the Afghans. I shared with them that we believe in a God who loves all people, regardless of their race or nationality. Praise the Lord.

It's challenging to get the congregation involved as most are still with the mindset of reaching out to Chinese only and they all lead a busy live. Usually only a small percentage of the congregation join in missions work or some are more drawn to attend during their annual missions conference. The best way to get people involved is to get them to try. Once they take that first step, their experience would hopefully draw them into being part of the Great Commission. It's also imperative to get the young people involved.

Since the refugees are brought to our doorstep already, we cannot say we don't see, or we can't help. I want to encourage churches and believers in Christ to
